#### **Assembly**






# BUGLAWTON PRIMARY SCHOOL

#### **LEIGHTON ACADEMY**

In September 2023, Leighton Academy, part of The Learning Partnership Trust, appointed its new Safeguarding Officers for academic year 2023-2024, as part of wider pupil leadership opportunities across the school. The Safeguarding Officers team consists of 8 pupils from Years 5 and 6, who are advocates for keeping children safe and incredible role models to the wider school community.

The pupils have taken part in a workshop with Miss Lockitt (Pastoral and Welfare Manager and DDSL for Leighton Academy), where they spent a Friday afternoon discussing everything they already know and understand about keeping children safe and learning new ways to help with this in school in their new roles. The team will be supporting voice of the child by encouraging the power of conversation with their peers, promoting positive relationships and looking after one another.

The team looked at 'Safeguarding Senses' and came up with brilliant ideas as to how safeguarding 'looks', 'feels' and 'sounds' both at home and in school. They have designed posters which will be promoted around the school and will be talking to peers about this at social times. The team are looking forward to their next workshop and are already embracing their roles, supporting anti-bullying and being a friendly face for pupils to talk to if they need to. The children will be helping to create a child-friendly Safeguarding Policy and will be working together to create additional ideas in order to further support the mental health and wellbeing of pupils at Leighton Academy.

The team are wearing their new badges with pride and are ready to help keep the school a safe, special and supportive environment to learn and flourish.








#### ST JOHN'S C of E PRIMARY SCHOOL

#### **ALL HALLOWS CATHOLIC COLLEGE**


At All Hallows we have Anti-Bullying Ambassadors who were trained about 18 months ago through the Diana Award. We have recently recruited some KS3 students as well, so the group has students from Y8 to Y11. The group meets with me (Mrs Lewis) once a fortnight and since September we have completed the following actions to promote anti-bullying (see the images below):

- 1. Anti-Bullying postcards that are sent to any students who've shown good anti-bullying traits, e.g. being a good friend, respect, standing up for what they believe in etc. Both staff and students have the opportunity to send these out and we've sent around 30 just since September
- 2. A 'Respect' display that the whole school contributed towards: each student in each form was asked to design a small feather on the theme of 'respect'
- 3. An article was published in the school newsletter
- 4. The ABAs designed and recorded an Anti-Bullying assembly to be played in all form rooms to celebrate Anti-Bullying week
- 5. The ABAs attended an online workshop with ideas and strategies to implement this year, on the theme of 'Make A Noise' (the theme of Anti-Bullying Week) and put posters up about this week around school.





# "Make A Noise" for Anti-Bullying Week Next week is National Anti-Bullying Week, led by the Anti-Bullying Alliance. This year's theme is "Make A Noise": "Too often, we are silent when we see bullying take place, silent about the hurt bullying causes, and silent when we hear bullyin dismissed as 'Just banter'. It doesn't have to be this way. Of course, we won't like everyone and we don't always agree, but we can choose respect and unity. This Anti-Bullying Week let's come together to have discussions about what bullying means to us, how banter can turn into something more hurtful, and what we can do to stop bullying. Together, we can make a difference and take a stand against bullying. From the playground to Parliament, and from our phones to our homes, let's make a noise about bullying." The Anti Bullying Ambassadors have been working hard to prepare for this upcoming week, designing an exciting display, creating a recorded assembly which will be shown in every form room next week, and getting ready to attend an online workshon Monday 13th okick the week off. They have also been asking staff and students to nominate other members of our college community for ABA Praise Postcards, which are being sent off to deserving people every week. ### WISTASTON ACADEMY

The children who attend the hub (enhanced resource provision) at Wistaston Academy have communication and interaction challenges with many of them being none or pre-verbal.

Therefore, a variety of strategies are adopted to provide communication tools for safeguarding purposes.

Through a process of discreet teaching and modelling in a varying array of contexts, the children are introduced to concepts such as keeping safe, sharing their opinions and giving and removing consent. In all instances, the children's understanding is supported through the use of visuals.

The Hub children are taught how to identify their body parts and express when something's hurt or doesn't feel right.






The children learn how to express when they like, don't like or are indifferent to an external stimulus. They can use their communication tools to ask for a particular food that they enjoy eating, to respond to a piece of music or to comment on an activity.



As part of their Sensory Circuit sessions, the children are offered head, arm and hand massages during the calm down process. The children are able to request or decline this offer using visuals. The visuals are kept by the children throughout the calming session so that they can change their minds to giving or removing their consent whenever they choose to.





The children learn how to identify a range of emotions in themselves and in others. These concepts are taught through acting, sorting activities and through the sharing of stories. The Hub staff carry emotion cards with them at all times and children are encouraged to express how they are feeling using these visuals to support their communication.

#### What should I do if I think someone is being bullied?

At Christ the King we all take responsibility in keeping each other safe. It is never OK to see someone being bullied and do nothing (being a bystander). You can tell people to stop (become a defender) or you can tell an adult about what has happened. If you think someone is being bullied then talk to the person, ask if they're okay and ask if you can help them talk to a teacher or an adult they trust.

What should I do if I'm being bullied?
If you are being bullied it is important to tell someone you trust. Tell an adult or friend, either at school or at home.
If you have already told an adult about bullying you can still tell them again.

- 1. Tell a teacher your class teacher, another teacher Or Mrs Wheelton 2. Tell your mum or dad or another relative
- Tell a friend you trust
   Tell any other adult staff in school such as Teaching Assistant:
- midday supervisors or the school office

- 5. Tell an adult at home 6. You can also put your peg in the talking heart 7. Call ChildLine at any time for free on 0800 1111. They will not tell anyone

If you tell a teacher or adult at school they will be able to help you.

They will talk to you and the people bullying to find ways to stop the bullying










### **BRIERLEY PRIMARY SCHOOL**

We discussed the different types of bullying and why this year's theme of 'Make a noise about bullying' is so important. The teachers then planned in activities throughout the week. They used low notes to represent bad feelings and high notes to represent happy feelings.

#### Language and its consequences

The pupils began by discussing what their understanding of safeguarding was and why do we do it.

AC said that it was about protecting females from males and males from females

When we looked at the definition of 'Safeguarding' and talked about 'impairment', GMK said that meant not allowing people to grow up healthily.

The group agreed that they were hearing sexist, racist and homophobic language around school. The group were asked to consider what effect hearing this kind of language could have on people.

FK said that words can really hurt people and make them feel horrible about themselves. LO said that words could threaten people. MBM said that words can make people feel low or scared or worried. CH said that unkind words can also make you feel isolated, self conscious, sad and negatively impact on a person's self esteem.

The group then watched a video where a young man talked about his experiences of being bullied in school and frequently being called 'gay'.

The group were asked for their thoughts on the video amd MBM shared that she has been called gay and homophobic language has been directed towards her

The group were then asked to consider what they understood by the phrase 'inappropriate language'. AC said that it meant swearing. GMK said it was people having sexual conversations in the corridors. GMK also said it was about calling someone's family, eg, 'you don't have a dad.'

The group were asked to think about how it may make someone feel to hear these things. FK said you may not want to come to school. AC said that if people were talking about you in that way then they were thinking about you and that could be a good thing. DO asked AC to clarify this, was any attention better than no attention. AC said yes. MBM said that if you were constantly being called a fat pig then you might start starving yourself.

The group then looked a little at the legal position where someone has used threatening, abusive or insulting language. It was explained that using language like this could constitue a criminal offense under the Pulic Order Act and the legal penalites for doing this were outlined. The 'Protected Characterisitics' were identified and a conversation was had around how if the language or behaviour used targeted someone with one of those protected characteristics then the police could choose to bring Hate Crime charges and the penalites if found guilty were much higher.

The group were asked to think about what we as a safeguarding group could do to challenge the inappropriate langage we hear. LO said that the boys were not going to change their (sexualised) language just because we ask them too. AC thought that if people ignored the language then people may get bored of using it as they weren't getting a reaction.

The group discussed the creation of a Boys group led by male staff where the boys could explore this and other topics further to mirror the Girl's group.

The pupils were asked if they felt they were being targeted by inapproparte language what they would do. FK said she would talk to a teacher. LO said that she ignored the comments. AC said that should only tell an adult when you were ready.



# WESTON VILLAGE PRIMARY SCHOOL

#### **ANTI BULLYING WEEK**

We started the week with a whole school assembly led by myself and our safeguarding and well being Y6 ambassadors. We spoke about the topic 'Make a Noise' and the difference between banter and bullying.

We then ran a whole school competition where children had to quite literally 'make a noise' about bullying by creating a video that spread a message about anti-bullying. Children across KS1 and KS2 made videos at home that had messages about the importance of being kind, the difference between banter and bullying, what to do if you think you are being bullied and why you should never bully. Children got really creative! Some children made poems, danced to meaningful songs, acted out different scenarios and one child even used her dolls to re-enact a banter and bullying scene- it was brilliant!

Myself and the safe guarding and wellbeing ambassadors, as well as the junior ambassadors, judged each one and picked a 1st, 2nd and 3rd winner for KS1 and KS2. The prizes were presented in our Friday Celebration assembly and the winning clips where shared with the whole school.

The videos worked really well and got the children talking about anti-bullying in school and at home!

#### **SAFEGUARDING AMBASSADORS UNITE!**



The safeguarding ambassadors from **Weston Village, Brine Leas, Audlem St** James and Alsager Highfields met up to collaborate on some rules for online safety. They discussed the 4 cs of online activity - content, contact, conduct and commerce. They then identified and agreed upon 10 rules for children to keep everyone safe online. These rules will be shared within each school. The meeting saw some thought-provoking conversations and impactful teamwork and the ambassadors are looking forward to more opportunities to work together later in the year.

## LACEY GREEN PRIMARY ACADEMY



We have done the following in school this term:

Become a member of the Anti-Bullying Alliance

Odd Socks Day- Anti-Bullying Week. Assembly about what bullying is presented by Ms Bacon and the school Parliament (children in Years 4,5 and 6). Children wrote and presented their understanding of what bullying is to KS2. They developed scenarios and acted them out in assembly for the pupils to watch and decide if they depicted bullying or falling out.

Since September we have talked a lot with all children about who they can turn to in school if they have a problem. All children are now aware that they can come to me any time in my role as pastoral support. Children who do not feel they can start a conversation about their worries can put a message in the worry box (KS2) or in their class worry monster (KS1) and I will talk to them.

I have updated the PSHE curriculum and renamed it personal development (the children did not really know what PSHE meant!) The curriculum across all year groups now includes more emphasis on mental health than in previous years as it had become clear that the mental health of children in school had become a priority.

Introduced Wellbeing Ambassadors. I started working with a small group of children last year who were finding coming to school difficult and were becoming more and more anxious. This was affecting their education and their families were becoming upset. We met weekly to discuss feelings and strategies for dealing with anxiety which improved their attendance at school. This year, they discussed how they could help other children in school as they know what it is like to be worried and the group are now Wellbeing Ambassadors. We introduced the team in an assembly so that if any child is having a bad day, feeling lonely or just need a chat, they know who they can turn to.

Found alternative ways of getting the child's voice-the Three Houses was not encouraging children to talk so we have found alternative ways of doing this.

# ST. MARY'S CATHOLIC PRIMARY SCHOOL, CREWE

Recently, teachers delivered the NSPCC interactive assemblies around the theme of abuse to all children and a volunteer came in and delivered engaging workshops linked to this program for students in Year 2, 5, and 6. The workshops not only provided essential information about personal safety but also created a supportive environment where children could openly discuss and comprehend the importance of safeguarding measures. Through interactive sessions and age-appropriate



#### **Anti Bullying Week**

The council launched the week with a Collective Worship explaining this year's theme and some of the activities the children would be partaking in over the course of the week led by Mrs Phillips.

The reception children planted seeds for a kindness garden and talked about the need to nurture friendships like we do the seeds. Years 1 and 2 decorated rocks with kind messages for a display and Years 3 to 6 made posters following the visit from Gripping Yarns storytellers whose performance was based on the theme 'Standing By'.

# THE MACCLESFIELD ACADEMY











# PEBBLE BROOK PRIMARY SCHOOL

The Bike Bus takes up the whole width of one side of the road, the safety of the children taking part is our highest priority and we make sure that everyone wears a Bike Bus high viz jacket.

We run our Bike Bus fortnightly on a F-Ride-Day and have found that it is a really fun and healthy way of getting to school. Our Bike has stopped now for the Winter but we will be restarting in March next year, when we hope to encourage even more participants!

We have had a busy term helping to keep the pupils (and adults) safe at Pikemere School.
